# RESOLUTION PROCLAIMING SEPTEMBER AS CHILDHOOD CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

- WHEREAS, childhood cancer remains the number one disease related killer of kids in the United States; one in five children are terminal at diagnosis; three in five suffer life altering impacts of treatment that significantly alter their quality of life; one in 285 children will be diagnosed with cancer before the age of 20; and
- WHEREAS, childhood cancer is on the rise; childhood cancers and adult cancers are different, yet we continue to use the downsized adult cancer protocols on kids with many times devastating effects; the lack of childhood cancer research has tremendous impact to kids and significant costs to society, now and in the future; and
- WHEREAS, despite these facts, childhood cancer research is vastly and consistently underfunded; less than four percent of the National Cancer Institute's Budget is solely dedicated to childhood cancer research; in 25 years the FDA has initially approved only two drugs for any childhood cancer and one-half of all chemotherapies used for children's cancers are over 25 years old; and
- WHEREAS, the incidence of childhood cancer is on the rise with an estimated 16,000 children diagnosed every year (43 per day) in the United States alone; of those 43 children per day, eight will die and somewhere in the world a child is diagnosed every two minutes; and
- WHEREAS, the incidence of cancer among adolescents and young adults is increasing at a greater rate than any other age group, except those over 65 years of age and an estimated 2,900 children die each year of cancer in the United States alone; the average age of death for a child with cancer is eight, causing a child to lose 69 years of expected life; and
- WHEREAS, many adult cancers can be diagnosed early, in 80% of kids, cancer has already spread to other areas of the body by the time it is diagnosed; and
- WHEREAS, the causes of most childhood cancers are unknown and at the present, childhood cancer cannot be prevented, and families who are or have been in treatment work tirelessly to change these alarming statistics.

WHEREAS, pursuant to I.C. 6-3.6-6-1, the Lake County Council is the adopting body which imposed a tax under I.C. 6-3.6-6-2 on the adjusted gross income of local taxpayers in Lake County served by the Lake County Council (Lake County Ordinance No. 1360B, imposing a Public Safety County Adjusted Gross Income Tax (CAGIT); and

- WHEREAS, pursuant to I.C. 6-3.6-6-8( c) a fire department, volunteer fire department, or emergency medical services provider that:
  - (1) Provides fire protection or emergency medical services within Lake County; and
  - (2) Is operated by or serves a public subdivision that is not otherwise entitled to receive a distribution of tax revenue under this Section, may before July 1<sup>st</sup> of a year apply to the Lake County Council for a distribution of tax revenues under this section during the following calendar year to be used for public safety purposes; and

Payments shall be made by the County within thirty (30) sizes after moving of said Teams by the County. The initial distribution formula is based on the Countyfield 2010 Census data determining the population in the unincorporated areas of the Townships.





Bilski acknowledged the USA Olympic Men's Basketball Head Coach, Gregg Popovich, born in East Chicago and a Merrillville Graduate whose team won the Gold Medal in Japan. He also sent congratulations to all American Athletes who represented and all those who won gold, silver and bronze medals.

Dr. Vavilala comments in regards to COVID:

"About 47% to 50% of the Lake County residents have been vaccinated. We have a lot of vaccines available; Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson & Johnson which are also available at the Lake County Health Department. Anyone can come and get vaccinated and they won't even need an appointment. As far as the current COVID-19 statistics, lately we have been seeing a trending up of the COVID positivity rate, especially in the past couple of weeks. There are five parameters that the Indiana State Department of Health follows: The first one is the positivity rate, which we have been seeing an increase in the numbers. Second one would be the emergency room visits, which we have been seeing an increase in the numbers. Third one is the hospitalization rate, which we have been seeing an increase in the numbers. Fourth one is the ICU bed availability, which is holding steady. The fifth and the final number is the mortality rate, which has not gone up. So, three out of the five parameters have gone up. So overall the county numbers, in terms of positivity, have gone up and this is a tread that we are seeing across the entire nation not necessarily just in the county. As of right now, 90% of the positivity cases are from the Delta virus which is much guicker to transmit. It is highly transmissible hence the reason it is spreading so fast among the people. This is what has caused the trend of the color code of Lake County to go from blue to yellow starting last Wednesday. The Richard Fairbanks school of Public Health, which closely monitors these numbers, is predicting that over the next few weeks we might see an increase in the numbers. At the health department, we have been receiving a lot of questions from the local schools and the local school boards asking us for the specific data within their zip code. We are doing our best to try to work with the Indiana State Department of Health to provide them to this data. But one thing we need to know is, I think our position should be mostly based on the tread in the entire county not necessarily just what's happening in our backyard. What we need to understand is if a virus can cross the ocean, I'm sure it can cross Route 30. I know these are very tough decisions, and we understand as the health department, but these are tough times. We have to make the tough decisions that are going to help our community as well as our students. It is for all our benefits to have our students an uninterrupted in school learning. Hopefully, we could all make decisions that could support good schooling for the children. The second question which we are also facing is, "How come the Lake County Health Department does not mandate certain things now?" As we did until a few months ago. For those people who are unaware, there is a new law which has been passed in the legislature called "SB 5" which only basically only gives the local health departments the authority to recommend to the Council as to what we basically believe is advisable as far as the Health is concerned. We cannot mandate anything. We would be happy to recommend what we believe is the right thing. I know it is not right to have the non-medical people to have to make medical decisions but this is a law that has already been passed. As of right now, we at the local health board, we can recommend what would be good for the county and the schools but we cannot mandate anything as I have done in the past. We have called a board meeting today for the health department but unfortunately, we did not have a quorum. We did not have four people. We just had three people who came to the meeting so we are unable to put out any recommendations from the Health department at least today. We will be meeting in the next couple of weeks again. We will do our best to actively take part in this and to give all advice, and we will be reaching out to the Council to see which way you would want to proceed."

# Public comments:

Doctor Debra McCullough stated that she hopes to address the council with the statistics of what has been done by the board so that can proceed and give more information to the schools.

Hanover Township Trustee Kevin Toth thanked the Council on behalf of all the Trustees for passing the Resolution for the CAGIT Funds.

There being no further business to come before the Council, it was moved and seconded that this Council

does now adjourn, to meet again as required by law.
